PASTOR'S NOTE

As 2013 winds down, I find myself feeling reflective, wondering where the year went. There were Sundays in worship and Wednesdays with the Youth. Time spent visiting, researching, reading, writing, and teaching. Meetings and preparing and dreaming and visioning. Planning, and praying. Walking the dog and making dinner.

2013 started with such promise. It was going to be the year I finally taught a Comparative Religion class, complete with field trips. It was going to be a year of getting healthy. Of moving beyond just reading the cookbooks to actually making some of the recipes. Now, 2014 is on the horizon, and for New Years Day I will probably spend some time doing research for my Comparative Religion class before I fix tuna and noodles for dinner.

Time is one of the great equalizers. No matter where we are in life, the very young, the very old, and everyone in between. Rich, poor, those with multiple college degrees and those whose formal education ended before high school graduation. No matter our gender, ethnicity, or station in life. We all get the same amount of time. No matter how many time saving devices I use, I can't generate more time or even stockpile the time I have saved to be used at a later date. The best I can do is try to be a good steward of the time I have, and one way I try to do that is by setting goals.

Goals and goal setting is a popular topic this time of year. Even if we don't reach our goals, they do serve to give us direction. Lewis Carroll said "If you don't know where you are going, any road will take you there." This is true in our personal life, our spiritual life, and in the life of the church. And New Years is a great time to look at and evaluate our goals.

Granted, we can change up our goals any time. There is nothing magical about New Years. Unless you consider that it marks the beginning of the year. And with a "new" year, there is the idea of "new" possibilities, adventures, and opportunities.

When it comes to setting goals, thinking of the things I personally want to accomplish is the easy part. At any given time I have six or seven or twenty ideas floating around in my head. All things that I think I might want to do sometime.

So when the New Year rolls around, I don't have any problem coming up with goals. The problem is the follow through. Goals are easy to set, but without a plan to accomplish the goal, you really only have an idea.

In my personal life, I can set goals that are significant to me. Period. Starting an exercise program, committing to getting up earlier to read and pray, or setting aside time once a week to do something significant. Those are all things that only directly impact me. Oh sure, sometimes I think about my family and how what I want will affect them. I once set a goal of maintaining a vegetarian diet for one month. And being the chief cook at our house meant that everyone was basically a vegetarian for one month. We didn't make it past the first week. For some reason, tuna fish and noodles without the tuna just isn't as satisfying as one might imagine.

Time management and goal setting is also important for the church. Of course, in the church, setting goals is a little more complicated or tricky. First off, we usually don't call them goals. In the church, goal setting is known as "casting a vision". That's much more difficult than just setting a goal, because casting a vision means getting the majority of the church members to buy into it, or believe in it. Casting a vision means realistically looking at where the church is today and dreaming or visioning about where **God** wants the church to be. That's hard work. Most of us are much more comfortable thinking about where we want the church to be. Or, nostalgically looking back at where the church used to be and wishing it could be that way again.

With the New Year on the horizon, it is time for us to begin thinking about casting a new vision for St. Paul. To help us do that, we will be having a Covenant Renewal Service during worship on January 12. This traditional service is a powerful time of self-examination and confession which leads to a renewal of commitment to discipleship. It reminds us of our commitment to be witnesses to Jesus Christ in the world, by the way we live and love every day. It is only when we are fully committed to Christ that we can hope to lead St. Paul in the direction God chooses.

Testifying With Mary and Others in Advent

On the second Sunday of Advent I had the opportunity to worship with one of the congregations of our conference. It was a joy and privilege. One of the pastors appointed to serve the congregation preached from Luke 1:26-56 and as you might expect focused on the unique angle of view that Mary brings to the God who is with us in Jesus Christ. The text for preaching includes what we have come to call the Magnificat (see verses 46-55). Mary has quite a story and quite a testimony to the activity of God and the invitation to her to be a big part of God's saving action.

The preacher also made great use of the stories of real people in real time. By prior arrangement and with her permission and blessing some of the story of one of the women in the congregation was shared. The intent was to point to the power of redemptive community. This particular woman's story included addiction, imprisonment and poverty. But when asked to share how long she had been sober she enthusiastically jumped to her feet and shared in years and days the length of her sobriety. She is a leader in this particular congregation and a visionary entrepreneur. She testifies to the power of the risen Christ and the community formed by him to make a difference in the lives of people.

On this same Sunday morning in this same church I attended a Christian formation group for men. The group was warm and welcoming and newcomers and visitors could fit in easily. As the men went around and shared about their week I heard not a few of the men point to the power of God and the ministry of this particular church in their lives. They spoke freely, honestly and openly about the past, the present and the future. They too were testifying.

The theme that seemed to tie the whole morning together for me was testimony: Mary and Elizabeth's testimony and the testimonies of women and men at this particular local church. I happen to believe that testifying and bearing witness to the activity and power of God in our lives is freeing and healing. Testimony empowers individuals and communities.

Practicing Our Faith, A Way of Life for a Searching People is a 1997 book edited by Dorothy C. Bass. It contains essays on twelve practices of Christian communities. I found the book and study guide useful in the late '90's. I turn to it now and again to refresh myself on these important practices that have formed, shaped and sustained Christian communities over time. One of the essays in the book is entitled "Testimony." It was written by Bishop Thomas Hoyt, Jr. a bishop of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church, who joined the church triumphant about six weeks ago. Bishop Hoyt says "In testimony, people speak truthfully about what they have experienced and seen, offering it to the community for the edification of all." He further points out "In different ways, testimony happens in every vital Christian community."

So in these Advent days of watching and waiting what about the activity of God in your life:

- Fills you with the Holy Spirit? (v. 41)
- Makes you blurt out blessings with a loud voice? (v. 42)
- Causes you to rejoice in God your savior? (v. 46)
